WEDNESDAY, MAY 6 —

Pre-Conference Tour to Beaufort, SC

Breakfast on your own • Lunch included • 9 a.m. Departure Drive by coach from Savannah, GA to Beaufort, SC Walking tour of historic and private homes, with local guides

Beaufort is the **second oldest city in South Carolina**, and is known for its breathtakingly beautiful **natural vistas and impressive architecture** from the Colonial and Antebellum Eras. The town of Beaufort is located on the island of Port Royal and is called the **Queen of the South Carolina Sea Islands** due to its charm, natural beauty, fascinating history and rich and diverse cultural heritage. Luncheon served in a private home, sponsored by the Beaufort County Open Land Trust. Tour the Parish Church of St. Helena, one of the oldest churches in North America. The Commons House of Assembly, under the Lords Proprietors of Carolina, established St. Helena's in 1712 as a colonial parish of the Church of England. Following the American Revolution, St. Helena's became part of the newly formed Protestant Episcopal Church. The present church building, dating to 1724, has been enlarged three times during its history. It appears today as it did in 1842.

OPENING RECEPTION at The Telfair Academy

Wednesday, May 6 • 6:30 p.m.

Designed by British architectural prodigy William Jay in the neoclassical Regency style, the **Telfair Academy** is a former mansion built from 1818-1819 for Alexander Telfair, son of Revolutionary War patriot and Georgia governor Edward Telfair.

8:15 a.m. Departure: Walk from the hotel to the Isaiah Davenport House for tours of the house followed by a talk by Christopher E. Hendricks at the Kennedy Pharmacy, across the street.

Trolley Tour: two-hour trolley ride giving an overview of Savannah, with one or two stops.

Lunch at Vic's on the River: this fine-dining restaurant in a 19th-century warehouse features classic Southern cooking.

In the afternoon, walk to tour three historic house museums:

Owens-Thomas House: Considered by architectural historians to be one of the finest examples of English Regency architecture in America. The house was designed by William Jay (1792-1837), one of the first professionally-trained architects practicing in the United States. The elegant residence was built from 1816-1819 for cotton merchant/banker Richard Richardson and his wife.

Andrew Low House: New York architect John Norris was commissioned to design and construct Andrew Low's house in 1848. Norris came to Savannah to design the Custom House on Bay Street and remained in Savannah to build many desirable residences with the latest in technology and luxury. The Italianate exterior features intricate cast iron railings and side balconies contrasting with the smooth stuccoed brick walls.

Green-Meldrim House: One of the South's finest examples of Gothic Revival architecture and the most expensive 19th century house in Savannah. Constructed for Charles Green, who came to Savannah from England in 1833, the home was designed by New York architect John S. Norris, who also designed the Custom House and several other fine homes. Union General William T. Sherman's army occupied the house in 1865, and now it is St. John's Episcopal Church Parish House.

8:45 a.m.: We will start the morning with a talk in the Chippewa Room at the hotel: *Understanding Savannah's Urban Plan and Architectural Traditions:* by Robin B. Williams, Ph.D., Chairman, Department of Architectural History, Savannah College of Art and design

Following the talk, we will depart from the hotel on foot to explore Savannah's famous Squares

The city of Savannah was laid out in 1733 around four open squares, each surrounded by four residential blocks and four civic blocks. The original plan (now known as the Oglethorpe Plan) allowed for growth of the city and thus expansion of the grid; additional squares were added during the 18th and 19th centuries, and by 1851 there were 24 squares in the city.

Congregation Mickve Israel is the only purely Gothic revival synagogue in the United States. Founded by a group of Sephardic Jews who landed in Savannah just a few months after General Oglethorpe, the congregation received a perpetual charter from Governor Edward Telfair in 1790. They represent the third-oldest Jewish congregation in the United States. In 1820, the congregation built the first synagogue in Georgia. The present synagogue, which looks more like a church than a synagogue, was designed by Henry G. Harrison and consecrated in 1878.

9 a.m. Departure: Depart from the hotel on foot this morning for a tour of some of the most prestigious private homes around Monterey Square.

Monterey Square was designed in 1847 and was named to commemorate the 1846 Battle of Monterey during the Mexican American War. It was the battle of the Mexican War in which a Savannah unit of the Irish Jasper Greens fought. The square's monument honors Casimir Pulaski, a Polish nobleman who was mortally wounded during the Siege of Savannah while fighting for Americans.

Lunch and Annual Business Meeting at the private Oglethorpe Club

The Oglethorpe Club was organized as a social club on September 18, 1870. The original quarters of the Club were located in the DeRenne Building on the northeast corner of Bull and Broughton Streets. In 1912, the Club purchased its present quarters on Bull and Gaston Streets. Built in 1857 in the Classic Revival style, this house was originally built as a private residence for Edmund Molyneux, British counsel at Savannah. Molyneux lived in this stately home, but it also served as the British Consulate until his return to England in 1863.

Afternoon Tours of Churches in the vicinity, including:

The First Baptist Church of Savannah: Chartered on November 26, 1800, the cornerstone of the present church on Chippewa Square was laid on February 2, 1831, and the building was completed in 1833. This Greek Revival structure is Savannah's oldest standing house of worship.

Unitarian Universalist Church of Savannah: Following her husband, prominent silversmith Moses Eastman's death in 1850, Eliza M. Tuthill Eastman fulfilled his wishes and funded completion of the church building. It was called a "little gem" and "an enduring monument to the generosity of its donors as well as a tasteful ornament to our city."

Cathedral of St. John the Baptist: Immigrants fleeing turmoil in Haiti and France established Savannah's first parish, the Congregation de Saint Jean-Baptiste, near the end of the 18th century. A devastating fire on February 6, 1898, destroyed all of the Cathedral but the outside walls and the two spires. The rebuilding began immediately, and the first mass in the rebuilt cathedral was celebrated on Christmas Eve, 1899.

Weather: May weather in Savannah is warm, with average daily highs in the low 80s and daily lows in the low 60s. It is advisable to check the local forecast before departure and dress accordingly.

Eating Out in Savannah: There are a number of restaurants – of various types, cuisines and price points – within walking distance of the hotel.
